We deliver a project called White Water Writers, in partnership with academics at Slough, Keele and Royal Holloway Universities. The project works with schools and particularly hard to reach students, to inspire and develop their ability through novel writing camps. We have developed software that is used in an afterschool club setting to allow groups of children who use
english as a second language to translate sub titles for popular TV programmes so that families, who may not speak or understand english, can watch english programmes with subtitles in their own language. see http://equalitytime.co.uk/projects/#supertitle. This helps children and their families to share the same experiences as their classmates and so promotes community cohesion and integration.

#### **Explain how the organisation carries out its purposes:**

We develop our original ideas for solving problems using technology and education:

Work is project based and each project may benefit a different section of the community, and use technology in different ways. EG, We knew that very many people with learning disability have no verbal communication and this causes frustration and a very poor quality of life and more, and that electronic speech aids are very expensive and it can be difficult for staff to programme and maintain them. Equality Time is developing The Open Voice Factory and this will provide people across the world with free software that can enable them to express themselves, and also that is easy to programme for care staff who arent technically minded. This project has won the NESTA tech for good prize for innovation. Each of our projects is original and is designed to solve a problem in society.

Equality Time delivers a project called White Water Writers which uses software that is specially developed to enable children to be published authors and raises their self esteem and gives a boost to their ability. Children who didnt think they could succeed are enabled to do so. We have worked with children who have autism, and cared for children, and many children who are disadvantaged in various ways - studies at Keele University, RHUL and Slough support the findings that children benefit significantly in a number of ways.

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#### What are the benefits of the organisation's purposes?

The founder has a doctorate in computer science, and other trustees are equally educated/expert in their similar fields. By applying new technology we can create opportunities to reduce inequalities and improve lives. Technology doesnt just touch a few people but can be used throughout the world. example project: The Open Voice Factory - We are developing software that can be used with proprietory equipment to provide speech (similar to that used by Stephen Hawking) Presently this is expensive and out of reach of most people in the UK and in the world. In the UK limited health budgets mean that few people are given this equipment. Our software is open source, and so can be used without cost, and it can be further developed and improved by IT specialists. It also provides entry level soft software so that speech therapists when assessing a potential user's ability to manage the equipment, can be reassured that recommending investment of many thousands of pounds in more specialised equipment will not be wasted.

Equality Time also uses its expertise to work collaboratively and this is true where science meets literature in White Water Writers: Week long novel writing camps (using a computer programme to manage the process) raise standards of literacy, confidence and aspirations, build team-working skills and improve concentration. The project has proven success with students of all abilities including children with autism, cared for children and will gifted and talented pupils also.

Supertitle is a project in development that helps families who use english as a second language to integrate better. Using a after-schools club format, children who are bi-lingual translate popular TV programmes providing sub-titles in their own language so that they can be watched at home with their families. The idea is to create a network of clubs that produce a range of sub-titled programmes that families anywhere can choose from. This project has potential to improve integration and with that reduce misunderstandings / tensions between cultures and it also provides improvements for the children involved in terms of personal self esteem, teamworking, language skills and confidence. The project is yet to reach its potential but outcomes to date are positive. A full project description is attached as a good example of how Equality Time's purposes provide benefit
